"As We See It"

DURING THE last few years there has been quite an increase in the number of youths who have been getting into mischief. The cause that is often offered is that the war conditions are responsible and to clarify this statement the explanation is offered that with the call to arms of the armed forces or working overtime on war requirements and the mother engaged in war work or perhaps in institutions, the youths have been left to shift for themselves, more or less. The result has been that they very often take the wrong road and get into trouble. To counteract this state of affairs we find clubs and various organizations trying to do all they can for those same youths. The idea is alright only it doesn't always work. Most of us have an idea that if we had some lad a pair of skates or a lacrosse stick or maybe a hockey stick that he will appreciate it and spend his spare time learning to use it, but such is not often the case. If that same lad wants a pair of skates or any of the other things mentioned badly enough to die in and save enough money to buy them, chances are that he will think a lot more of them than if he had them given to him. He will take better care of them and besides all this he will have learnt the value of money and the amount of work it took to save that amount of money.

SKATING RINKS have been given a certain amount of publicity this last while. In some towns such as Acton and Elora the skating rinks have been rented for the duration and are used as storage buildings and the result is of course that those particular towns have no rink for their youths to spend the winter evenings in. It doesn't seem quite right and on the other hand we find towns that have rinks which will be operated this winter seem to be having their troubles also. Both Ferris and Harrison have rinks that will be used for skating, hockey and curling this winter, and what do we find there? During the summer both of these towns report that their rinks have been broken in to and considerable damage has been done. Again it is the local youths that get the blame for the damage and if that is so we would naturally conclude that those same youths do not appreciate the action of those good citizens who have provided them with a decent rink. Neither of the towns mentioned are so large that the parents of those youths responsible for the damage wouldn't be able to keep track of their children, we would imagine, and it looks like carelessness somewhere surely. If it were possible to have an order issued making the rink "Out of Bounds" for those youths responsible for the damage for all winter it might bring home to them the folly of their actions. It is discouraging to those responsible for providing luxuries like a skating rink to find that the very ones that they had in mind when providing that rink apparently don't appreciate it.

WITH CHRISTMAS just around the corner, once more, the old, old habit of wondering what to give is having its innings once more. Like so many other things this habit of giving to those that neither appreciate our gifts nor do they even want them is overdue. Today the youngster that doesn't get a couple of dozen gifts at least thinks that it has been gipped and because of the number of gifts received they very often are not half appreciated. Again we call attention to the habit of sending Christmas cards. They are nice we will admit and it was awfully kind of somebody to take time out to think of us at Christmas time, but we would have liked it much better had they sat down and written us a letter instead. To get a card with the usual notation "From Beth and Bob" starts us wondering how their children are getting along and we wonder if they are old enough to have joined the forces or not. However, the card doesn't give us any information about them at all and we will have to wait for dear knows how long to find out anything about them. A Christmas letter would be so much more satisfactory and if it enters into the picture at all would be less costly.

AN EXTRA effort is being made in many municipalities this fall to get a large percentage of the residents that have a vote to turn out and exercise their franchise. While different ideas are being given a trial they all have the same objective and it will be interesting to notice the success that the experiment may have. It has been suggested from time to time that voting should be made compulsory. However that idea seems to smack of dictatorship and we want to steer clear of anything along that line. The person who finds the most fault with the government is often the one who never votes at all and in that case is largely responsible for that particular government having been elected. The weather and the state of the roads on voting day has something to do with the turnout and again the voters very often are satisfied with the way the country or municipality in which they happen to live is being
