**7th Blood Donor
Clinic Largest Yet**

The seventh Red Cross Mobile Blood Donor clinic was held in the Legion Rooms last Wednesday morning, when ninety three persons donated blood, making it the largest clinic yet held here. Of the 93 donors, 66 were men, and 27 women. There were 42 new donors, consisting of 18 men and 24 women. Miss Aynsley R. N., was the Nurse Technician in charge of the clinic, assisted by members of the local committee who have been playing their particular parts in previous clinics. The only change in personnel this time was in the refreshment committee, of which Mrs. A. Duncan had charge.

It is a matter of interest to note that there were 238 names on the donor enrollment register for this clinic, and many who could not be taken this time will be eligible for the next clinic. This was very gratifying to the committee in charge of the Blood Donor work, and they wish to express their appreciation to the group of interested blood donors who did such fine work in recruiting volunteers for the clinic. In connection with all Mobile Blood Donor Clinics, a new order has been issued from Red Cross Headquarters that haemoglobin and blood pressure tests must be taken of all applicants before they are accepted. This is, needless to say, for the protection of the donors, and at the same time constitutes a splendid check-up on the health of the applicants.

Since February 5th of this year, there have been 422 people from Georgetown and vicinity, who have donated their blood to the work of saving lives.

There are now 60 men and women in Georgetown and vicinity eligible to wear the bronze button, but owing to a hold-up in the manufacture of these buttons they are not available at present.
