The last regular meeting of Esquering Township Council was held on Wednesday. All members of Council were present and Reeve C. H. May, presided. Minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

Moved by Wilson, seconded by Cleave, that an order be paid Action Electric Co. for repairs on the telephone line, \$10.00. Bell Telephone Co. for repairs on the Municipal Garage, \$27.75. Dr. H. T. Paul, \$2.82. The Council also heard and passed a resolution to provide for holding Municipal Elections for the year 1944 and that said by-law be now read a first time. Carried.

Moved by Wilson, seconded by Murray, that By-Law No. 981 to provide for holding Municipal Elections for the year 1944, having been read a first time be now read a second and third time and passed and the seal of the Corporation be attached thereto. Carried.

Moved by Murray, seconded by Cleave, that the Treasurer pay Canadian General Insurance Co. (to George C. Brown) renewal Bond No. 286382, Joseph Hanford, Tax Collector, to December 1944, \$37.50.—Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Wilson, that the Reeve do now vacate the chair and it be taken by the Deputy Reeve.—Carried.

Moved by Wilson, seconded by Cleave, that the thanks of this Council are hereby tendered to Reeve C. H. May for the courteous and impartial manner in which he has presided over the meetings of this Council during the past year.—Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Wilson, that we do now adjourn.—Carried.
