Georgetown to Have Intermediate Hockey Team

Brampton Soldiers to Play Home Games Here. Curling to Start.

At a meeting last night in the Curling Club Rooms of the newly appointed Board of Parks Management in charge of the Arena, final arrangements were made for starting the hockey season in Georgetown. The hockey team from No. 24 Basic Training Centre in Brampton will play all their home games on Georgetown ice, starting next week. There will be a Georgetown Intermediate Hockey team this year as well to still further brighten up the sports picture in town, and having definitely entered into the O.H.A., it is expected our team will be linked up with Guelph.

There has been a good sheet of ice in the Arena for the past three weeks, of which skaters in town have made good use. The Board of Parks Management decided last night that school children should be granted free skating two afternoons a week and also be given an opportunity to play some free hockey.

The curling is being made and it is expected that the Curling Club will get organized this week and members will be sweeping the stones down the ice by week's end.

The Board of Parks Management has been appointed by special act of council to have absolute charge of the arena for three years.

At a previous meeting held by the Board in the Municipal Building, they elected W. G. Bell as Chairman and the other members of the Board, viz: J. J. Gibbons, P. B. Blackburn, Clarence King, Howard Kentner, James Richardson, split up into individual committees to manage the Arena. It is their main intention to give the Arena to the people of Georgetown for good wholesome fun, and their beginning augurs well for the success of their term.

A manager has been hired, Mr. W. Dorman, King St., who was formerly employed by the C.N.R. here.
