der the Park's Act they are entitled to receive 1 mill for this purpose.

From the above facts, you will see that we now have no further surplus to dip into, but must make a levy to pay off way as we go and in addition to that we will have to provide for the additional expenditures undertaken by the 1943 Council.

I can see no other alternative than that the tax rate will have to be increased, in view of this I am asking that every member of the Council cooperate in seeing that the expenses for this year are kept as low as possible—always giving due thought to the proper carrying on of the business of the municipality so that no proper service will be impaired.

As mentioned above, if the war ends there may be considerable unemployment of conditions here and elsewhere during the transition from war to peace. We have—I understand, over two hundred people working at Malton. They may not all be able to secure work here when the war ends. I feel that the Council should endeavor to see if there are any ways and means of obtaining new industries for Georgetown. Unless the elected representatives of the municipality give leadership in looking towards the future welfare of the town you can hardly expect it of others.

It has been very gratifying to see the large new addition that has been added to the Smith & Stone plant in town. There were a great many people who were very skeptical 20 years ago when Smith & Stone located in Georgetown. This loan has been entirely repaid with interest and Georgetown now has a fine large plant, em-

ploying 300 people. A new addition, as I have mentioned, has been added and I feel sure that in the near future it is possible that Smith & Stone will be employing possibly 500 people. Have you ever realized that if the Smith & Stone plant had not been brought to Georgetown 25 years ago it is doubtful if the town would be as large as it is now. This is every reason why we should endeavor to be ever alert to see if we can't get other industries to come and locate in our town.

I would also ask Council to give every consideration to the matter of the dump in the park. This is very unsightly and unsanitary in our park and should be moved elsewhere.

There are many matters of interest to the ratepayers that I could call to your attention, but no doubt each of these will come up for discussion at some time during the year, and I will reserve my remarks until then.

In closing I wish to say that it is my earnest desire to co-operate fully with every member of this Council and every municipal officer of this corporation in carrying on our municipal government so that the affairs of the municipality will be carried on with the highest efficiency and with the greatest benefit to the ratepayers whose servants we are.
