Keen Interest In Seed Display

SPONSORED BY HALTON CROP IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION

Seventy-three lots of grain and seeds were on display at the Milton Town Hall, on Saturday, January 29th. The event was conducted under the auspices of the Halton Crop Improvement Association, with the primary object of bringing together the farmer with seed for sale and those who have not secured their requirements. The display was representative of approximately 9,000 bushels of coarse grains, and 2000 bushels of small seeds.

President Edwin Harrop acted as chairman for the afternoon program which brought out approximately 100 farmers, R. H. Graham, of the Ontario Livestock Branch, Toronto, was the chief speaker, with Jas. Laughland of the Field Husbandry Department, O.A.C.; C. L. S. Palmer, of the Dominion Seed Branch; W. E. Breckon, chairman of the Seed Section of the Provincial Aerie, Commission of Inquiry participating in the discussion arising from a question box.

In the morning Halton Junior Farmers held their Annual Judging Competitions in Grain and Seeds, Fruit and Vegetables, and Cream Grading, with 27 young men competing. Gordon Leslie of Acton was the high man of the day, with Ward Brantford of Georgetown runner-up and high junior. The Halton Cream and Butter Trophy was won by Fraser McNabb of Georgetown; the Strathmore Orchard Trophy by Ward Brantford of Georgetown; and the Halton Seed Trophy by Gordon Leslie of Acton. ORDER "FOUNDATION" and "FOUNDATION A" for Certified Seed Production. All fields entered for certification in 1944 must be planted with either "Foundation" or "Foundation A" seed potatoes.
