To the Editor, Georgetown Herald.

Dear Madam:

Enclosed is a clipping of an editorial from the Globe and Mail of March 4th date. Some of your readers think more publicity should be given to it, and we are asking you to print it at our expense.

At the same time may we draw the attention of Herald readers to the recent articles in Maclean's Magazine, (Feb. 15th, and March 1st) re the V. D. menace described as Canada's Number One Saboteur.

None of the articles above mentioned, however have seen fit to connect this terrifying prevalence of social disease in Canada with the drinking habits of her citizens. That, we in Georgetown at least, may not miss this connection, may I quote ONCE MORE the published statement of Lt. Col. Donald H. Williams, Chief Venereal Disease Control Officer for Canada: "Alcohol is the lubricant of the facilitation process. It enables the wheels of facilitation with smoothness and despatch relentlessly to hasten healthy citizens to ill-health and misfortune." (Quoted in Ken MacTaggart's Article "Social Ills Facilitated by Alcohol" Globe and Mail, June 28th, 1943).

To show that the above fact is recognized by other authorities on this question, may we refer your readers to the statement of Dr. Ivan Emerson, (Professor Emeritus of Public Health Practice, Columbia University) in his book "Alcohol, Its Effects on Man", in the chapter headed "Alcohol in Relation to Venereal Disease". (available in our Public Library).

A Scandalous Liquor Bill

The latest official figures on the national consumption of liquor since the war began are material for several moral indictments of the Canadian people. The rise in this consumption has been progressive throughout the war years. As compared with 1939, the total amount of spirits, malt liquors (including beer) and wine purchased by the public in 1943 had increased by 40, 50, and 30 per cent, respectively. There is a further estimate that Canada's liquor bill in terms of money mounted last year to \$250,000,000 from a prewar figure of \$153,000,000. But this spread of over 63 per cent is partially accounted for by the sharp rise in the taxes on all kinds of drink.

An expenditure of \$21 per capita is a scandalously high scale of liquor consumption even in peace, and it is more deplorable in wartime! The reasons for it are not hard to seek. For one thing, large numbers of our people have been enjoying their highest earnings for many a long day. Despite the heavy taxation, they have more money to spend after the daily necessities of life have been provided for. Many kinds of luxury goods on which they might have spent these funds are not obtainable, but one type of luxury, liquor, is still available, and so it is bought freely. Again, the general emotional upheaval which war inevitably brings makes thousands of people turn to liquor as an anodyne for frayed or shattered nerves. For many it has become an escape, and they use it as a narcotic rather than a social lubricant.

But these are excuses, and no adequate defense for our inordinately large liquor bill. The figures are astounding, and one does not need to be a prohibitionist to be gravely shocked by them. In the years when the Treasury is hard pressed to finance the national war effort and a variety of beneficent organizations working for the welfare of our fighting men are ur-
