AN \$18,000 BULL FOR O.A.C.
PROF. KNOX BUYS TWO BULLS
WILL ALSO BUY AN AYSHIRE

Ontario Agricultural Herds Coming to Front—Pigs and Sheep Will Be Purchased in Scotland—Bulls Secured at Perth Are Best of Their Breed.

Professor Knox, of the Ontario Agricultural College, attended the annual Shorthorn calf sale in Perth, Scotland, recently and with money subscribed by business men he purchased a Short-horn bull calf about eleven months old, for 4,000 guineas, about \$18,400. This calf was first in his class at the show and is said by people who saw him to be a very promising calf. This calf is Uppermill Royal and sired by Aldie Conqueror, an outstanding sire, owned by Duthie Webster at Collynie. As his name indicates the bull purchased was bred by James Durno and is of the choicest breeding to be found in Scotland.

The champion at Perth was a calf bred by Honeyman at Belleclm, and he sold for 2,000 guineas to Mrs. B. H. Linzee-Gordon, of Cluny Castle, Aberdeenshire. The reserve champion

was bred by Kenneth MacGillivray, of Kirkness, Inverness, and was sired by Lawton Field Marshall by Collynie State Express and he sold in the auction for 2,400 guineas. The second reserve champion was bred by A. J. Marshall, of Bridgebank, Strausner, and sold for 3,000 guineas. Besides buying Uppermill Royal at the high price of the sale, Prof. Knox bought an April calf from Duncan Stewart, of Mill-hills, sired by Collynie Elect for 550 guineas. This is a choicely bred calf and comes from the same herd as Mill-hills Ransom, purchased for the O.A.C. at the Perth sale of 1936 by Hon. Duncan Marshall. Millhills Ransom has built up the College herd of Short-horns until it is the best at any Agricultural College on this continent, and the two bulls, one a son and the other a grandson of Ransom are two of the best bulls of their breed to be found on any farm. New blood was needed to keep the herd up to its present excellence and
