BRAMPTON

Found guilty on a charge of manslaughter, Carl Larson of Brampton was sentenced to a prison term of two years less one day when he appeared before Justice Greene in the Ontario Supreme Court here last night.

300 MILES RURAL HYDRO SUMMER PLAN

Commission Has Accepted 4,000 Farm and 2,000 Urban Contracts—If Labor Available.

Fostering a bill to reduce rural hydro rates and extend the power services throughout the country, Hydro Commissioner G. H. Challies last week declared that the Ontario Government plans to bring modern electrical equipment within reach of every farm house in the province.

Mr. Challies disclosed the Hydro intends building 300 miles of rural lines this summer unless there are labor and material problems. He pointed out the commission has accepted 4,000 farm contracts and 2,000 urban contracts for electrical services, the largest volume in the history of the province for a similar period.

It is the intention of the Government to provide farmers with facilities to obtain every type of electrical equipment, including quick freezing units, at a minimum cost", said Mr. Challies.

Before you blame your telephone...

CHECK THIS DISTANCE

Engineers designed the mouth-piece of your telephone to give best results at one-quarter of an inch from the lips. When your lips are farther away than this, your voice is transmitted less strongly... less clearly.

Failure to remember these simple facts accounts for the great majority of "trouble" reports.

Help avoid needless service check-ups, and at the same time let those you talk to hear you without strain. Just remember: Talk clearly, normally, directly into the telephone, with your lips just one-quarter of an inch from the mouthpiece.

On Active Service **Giving Wings to Words**

Smoking while you talk may cause distorted reception. It also prevents your holding the telephone in correct position, close to the lips.

If you need to reach across your desk as you talk, continue to hold the telephone in correct position, close to the lips.

A wall set can't come to you; stand or sit so that your lips are directly in front of and close to the mouth-piece. Don't "talk across" it.

For clear, noise-free transmission, always keep your desk telephone upright—not at or near the horizontal position.

"The Hydro Laboratories have been working for months on plans to provide cheap power (and bring such equipment to the farms. Through quick freezing units farmers may enjoy in midwinter the berries and vegetables they produced in the summer," he said.

The Hydro Commissioner told the Legislature that some of these quick freezing units can hold 60 dozen ears of corn, six crates of strawberries, six crates of raspberries as well as poultry and meat. "You can just imagine how valuable they will be to our farmers. Summer surpluses will be available to the farmer in the winter."

Mr. Obalies said the Hydro Commission proposes to send out mechanized units to display to the farmer and his wife the latest electrical machinery and gadgets available.
