**Norval Juniors Hear Outstanding Speakers**

The regular monthly meeting of the Norval Junior Farmers and Junior Institute was held at the home of Craig and Bruce Reid on Tuesday, March 14th.  
The boys were fortunate in having as their guest speaker, Mr. W. E. Breckon, well known farmer of Freetown. Mr. Breckon, who is a member of the Provincial Agricultural Commission of Inquiry gave a thought provoking address in which he reviewed agricultural production trends of the past and present and also prospects for the post war period. In dealing with the necessity of meeting competition within our own Country which may force us in Ontario to adjust our production methods and general economic set-up. "Anyone," stated Mr. Breckon "depending on price or pressure group action as a solution for their problems is due for an awakening."  
The girls also had a very interesting meeting. Mrs. T. Grieve, superintendent of the Georgetown Branch of the St. John's Ambulance Association, gave a talk and demonstration of the work carried on by them. She told in a very interesting way something of its origin, the services it has rendered through so many years and the important place it has in the present world struggle. Mrs. Grieve pointed out some of the general principles of first aid and home nursing and followed this up with demonstrations of bandaging and artificial respiration.  
Jim Carney, Jr., Farmer's President, acted as chairman for the joint meeting. After business discussions, he called on Mr. Whitelock who introduced the guest speaker, Dr. W. R. Graham of Burlington as a farmer, head of the Poultry Dept. of the O.A.C. and the representative of the Poultry Industry on the Agricultural Commission of Inquiry. Dr. Graham then addressed the group taking as his subject "Take a look at yourself". "The first duty of a nation," stated Dr. Graham, "is to feed its people, which in turn means we must have of necessity, a planned agriculture". Reference was also made by the speaker to possible developments in agriculture as a result of the application of science. In this connection, reference was made to a compound made from soya beans which tastes like beef steak. While your pedigree and environment are important factors in whether or not you prove to be a success, the most important factor is "You", he stated.  
A most interesting feature of the evening's programme was the presentation to Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hartley (nee Dorothy Cleave) of a card table by Charlotte McCullough, president of Jr. I., and John McNabb.

counts—\$118. The chairman also asked the opinion of the council as to the advisability of more land being purchased by the Committee for further reforestation purposes. Council advised the committee to inquire into what lands might be available for the purpose and report at the next meeting. Mr. Craig suggested that the townships might have tax lands available not suitable for any other purpose. Council as a whole was strongly in favor of carrying on and increasing its reforestation project.  
County buildings—Accounts passed for payments totalled \$244.83.  
Hospital accounts — \$1412.50. The chairman, Reeve J. M. McDonald asked if all these accounts were being properly checked by the municipalities, citing cases where he thought payment should have been collected. The various reeves asserted that every effort was being made to see that all cases receiving hospitalization were genuine.  
Finance—Accounts passed for payment—Children's Aid Society and Ontario Training School for Girls—\$994.70. The report further recommended that the report from the House of Refuge be accepted; also that of the County auditors. A letter from the Bank of Nova Scotia had been received stating the rate of interest to be charged on loans to the county had been reduced to 4 per cent.  
Printing—Accounts passed for payment—\$63.58.  
Special Communications—There was considerable correspondence most of which was filed. Special grants arising from various requests were as follows: Hospital for Sick Children \$50; Red Cross Society \$1000 to be divided equally among the five branches in the county.  
Reeve Near of Naasgawaya and Reeve Robertson of Nelson were com-

missioned to attend a meeting of the Board of Transport Commission with regard to railway crossings at Campbellville and Fisher's Corners.  
With regard to the Lorne Scots regiment, it was moved by Messrs. Hillmer and Craig that the Lorne Scots regiment of Halton, Peel and Dufferin be granted the sum of \$600 and the Regimental Band a grant of \$400. Carried.  
Moved by Messrs. J. M. McDonald and Heslop that E. Harrop be appointed to fill the unexpired term of Humphrey R. Brown lately deceased, on Milton High School Board. Carried.  
The Warden announced that the next meeting of the Council would take place on April—18 at 10.30 a.m. when the children from the various schools throughout the county would again be entertained by the Council. Detailed arrangements were left in the hands of the county engineer, Mr. Roy Smith.  
Council adjourned.
