(Prepared by the Association of Children's Aid Societies of the Province of Ontario.)

Have you ever grieved over a lost

It will Alister and Roy Hindley were the tell you something about the struggle of over half a century to enact laws and establish children's courts and develop Children's Aid Societies with this one aim and purpose: That no little boy or girl in Ontarlo should be neglected or abused-living without proper care, without happiness, without a just and fair chance of growing. strong and sound in body and mind.

There is no work in the community comparable to this work among the children who have been deprived of normal homes, natural loving perents and an equal chance to grow to happy and useful citizenship with the other children in their community. Nothing comparable because it embraces a hope and a value that only work among children can bring. It is a work that every man and woman in every community throughout Ontario can help in some way or other.

Some can help through volunteer work on local Children's Aid Committees, some by participating in the management of the Children's Aid Society -which is the people's own democratic organization. Some can help by offering boarding homes for little homeless children. All can help by understanding just what the local Children's Aid 80clety is doing and trying to do and by using their influence as citizens to bring about even stronger laws and Early Spring Needs higher standards for child care in this banner province of the Dominion.

Let us go back not much more than half a century ago and see how the neglected and ill-treated child was faring at the hands of comfortably placed, well-fed citizens whose own children were enjoying every care and protection. How much \_thought was given to these little waits girls as well as boys-who used to run the streets night and day selling newspapers in Canadian Cities at the tender age of ten and even younger? What laws protected children against brutal, irunken, deprayed parents? What shelter was to be found for children with actually no homes at all, good or

Do you know that in Canada, the United States and England the movement for the protection for animals actually preceded the movement for the protection of children?

There was a good woman in New York-a Mrs. Wheeler-who one day about the year 1880 heard of a poor woman dying of tuberculosis in a tenement and visited her. But when she sat by her bedside the dying woman said: "it is too late to do anything for me-see what you can do for that Sunday April 2nd. poor little fellow across me hall whose drunken parents beat him unmerciful-

Mrs. Wheeler went across the hall and found a child so brufsed and bat tered, so forsaken and unhappy that she went all over New York to enlist ald in bringing the parents to justice. She visited clergymen, lawyers, police courts, only to discover that no law existed there under which parents could be charged with cruelty to their own children. Finally she went to the president of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and this gentleman, who was also a lawyer, became interested and between them they decided to attempt to make a charge of "cruelty to a human animal."

They secured a conviction and this astounding case aroused public interest and sympathy and thus was initiated the movement for laws and institutions to protect children throughout the United States.

In the next article I will tell you how a group of humane people first sought protection of Toronto children under a common banner for protection 10 a.m. of animals; and what happened when an effort was made to nave a Winnipeg animal protection society extend its interest to neglected and ill-treated children whom no one had thought to protect.


