### RETAIL BUSINESS

"Fears were felt at the outset that the independent trade, the small trade, would not get its fair share, but these fears have proved groundless," said R. F. Chisholm, Co-ordinator of Distributive Trades, WPTB, in his address to the Canadian Retail Federation Conference last week.

During 1943 independent retailers increased their sales 5.8%, country general stores 9.7%, while department stores and mail order businesses have decreased 1.0% and chain stores decreased 2.3%.

"Retail failures in Canada during 1943 were at the lowest point since before the last war," stated Mr. Chisholm.
