SEED PARTICIPATION CERTIFICATES MUST BE PRESENTED AT ONCE

The 1943 crop of Alaska and Red Clover Seed was in the main sold on a cleaned basis and producers in addition to the agreed price between buyer and seller, also received Participation Certificates. These certificates will entitle the producers to a proportionate share in any surplus from the marketing of the seed exported from Canada by the Special Products Board. Recently we learned from Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitebeck that Halton seed producers in order to have their applications receive consideration must submit their Participation Certificate or Certificates to F. G. Perrin of the Seed Export Office, Lindsay, on or before May 15th. In view of the fact that the majority of Halton Seed Producers received disappointing returns from their 1943 crop, we hasten to bring this information to their attention, in order that they may participate in any surplus resulting from seed exported from Canada by the Special Products Board.
