Sanitary Notice




Township of Esqueving

J. Henry Denny Dies at Acton

Born in Erin Township and a lifelong resident of this district, Joseph Henry Denny passed away on Friday, May 12, at his home on Queen Street, Acton. He was in his eighty-second year. Mr. Denny had been about as usual until Monday when a severe cold rapidly developed into pneumonia and in spite of all that loving care and attention could do, he passed away on Friday.

Joseph Henry Denny was a son of the late Robert and Anna Denny. He was a descendant of the pioneer settlers of the Churchhill district. His great grandfather was Rev. Hiram Denny, the first minister at the Churchhill Church and he was a grand nephew of the late Rev. Jos. Elitz. With such a root in the church, it was small wonder that at the age of 16 he became a member of the Methodist Church on the second line. He maintained that interest all through his life, for thirty years he was a member of the Trustee Board and the Session of the United Church in Acton. For five years he taught a class of boys in the Sunday School. It was rarely indeed that the services on Sunday and through the week did not find him there and taking whatever part he could.
