## Fighting Canadians

### NORTH ATLANTIC TRAGEDY

Sinking of the frigate H.M.C.S. Valleyfield while on convoy escort duty in the North Atlantic adds a tragic chapter in the epic of Canada's Navy. Of the crew 38 survive, five are dead, and 121, including the captain, are listed as missing.

Everything possible was done to save survivors, and rescuers from the corvette H.M.C.S. Giffard displayed "heroism of the highest order" according to Lieutenant Gordon H. Patterson, RCNVR, of Vancouver, Officer in command of Giffard sea-boat which rescued eight men was Lieut. Ralph Milton, 26, of Mount Royal, P. Q. The four ratings, who according to their captain, Lieutenant-Commander Charles Peterson, RCNVR of Victoria, were "physically exhausted after more than an hour of back-breaking heart breaking effort and so soaked with black fuel oil they could no longer hold their oars" were Leading Seaman Douglas Edgar, 22, RCN, of Swift Current, Sask. Able Seaman Donald Marks, 24, RCNVR of Halifax; Stoker Charles Coleman, 20, RCNVR, of Victoria, and Signaller Donald Bonnell, 22, RCNVR Toronto.

A 21-year-old sick berth attendant, Edward N. Bailey, of Saint John, N.B. was only 15 days at sea before he was plunged into one of Canada's darkest naval tragedies, was warmly praised.

Chief engine-room artificer Norman Fraser of Sydney, N. S., whose wife lives in Edmonton, supervised the throwing of scrambling nets over the side of the corvette Giffard, and personally saved many of the numbed, oil-blinded swimmers by going down to the water's edge and grasping them.

Chief engine-room artificer William Bond, of Edmonton, who retired from the Royal Navy in 1923 before enlisting at outbreak of war, was praised by the captain of the Giffard for getting every possible bit of speed out of the ship without endangering her.

Bitterly ironic was the death of Surgeon-Lieutenant Clarence E. Irvine, 37, RCNVR of Timmins, Ontario, who did not belong to H.M.C.S. Valleyfield but had come on board on an errand of mercy to attend a sick man. Instead of going to an officer's cabin, he remained in sick bay with his patient and thus met his death. He was never seen from the time the torpedo struck.

BASEBALL MISSIONARY  
Wing Commander G. N. Parrish has brought baseball in India. This 23 year old lad from R. R. 2 Listowel, Ont., who used to play ball for Listowel Collegiate, decided to bring Canada's "national game" to sport minded pilots of the R.A.F. and has succeeded, to some extent at least, in supplanting their cricket bats with a good old fashioned willow.

"I found a dozen Canadians on the Squadron, and have persuaded even Australians and British crews to get in the game" Parrish said.

The lads play on a diamond beside an airfield from which they launch dive-bombing attacks on Jap positions.

QUINTS NURSE IS OVERSEAS  
Nursing Sister Marie Corriveau of Penetang, Ontario, has gone overseas for duty with the RCN, after exciting experiences in Halifax, Newfoundland and Cornwallis, N. S. The former Dionne quintuplet's nurse was called to Newfoundland after the K of O Hotel fire in December, 1942, when the naval hospital was crowded with burned victims.

ARMY DECORATIONS  
Awards to four other-ranks in the Canadian Army have been announced by National Defence Headquarters. Lance-Corporal Douglas Halg Maxwell of Merritt, B. C. and Private Fabien George LeBlanc of Cambellton N. B., received the Military Medal, while the United States Silver Star went to Sergeant Vernon Joseph Doucette of Yarmouth, N. S., and to Private (Acting-Sergeant) Lindsay Scharfe of Renfrew, Ont.

WINCO AT 80  
Richard Hyde, 26, has come a long way since he left school back in Wawa, Saskatchewan, 1941. In Britain, he's known as Wing Commander Richard Hyde, DFM, with a tour of operations under his belt as an air gunner. He has seen such enemy targets as Essen, Hamburg, Gelsenkirchen, Berlin and Hanover, has survived an even dozen attacks by enemy fighters, and has scored one "damaged".

MID-SEA RESCUE  
Leading Seaman Gordon McQuarrie, of Revelstoke, B. C. found his experience as an aquatic sprinter in regattas back home stood him in good stead when he was washed overboard off the coast of Ireland. He was in the water for about 30 minutes before his ship, corvette H.M.C.S. Dauphin turned back and picked him up, but he didn't notice the cold and stood watch that night as usual!
