## Part. N.S. Irene Mulholland Part of Invasion "Air Umbrella"

Lead Nursing Sister Irene Mulholland is named as being one of the four who are the only women members of the 2nd Tactical Air Force, which forms part of the "air umbrella" covering troops invading Normandy.

The special dispatch from London, telling of the nurses' participation in the invasion describes them as wearing blue battle dress, high Auxiliary Territorial Service boots and caps. They live in tents, which they pitch themselves.

Nurses use the ordinary R.C. and R.A.F. officers' mess, and are considered an integral part of the 2nd Tactical Air Force establishment. They will move with headquarters when it goes further afield, and will continue to operate with the flying ambulances and the flying W. A. A. F. ambulances, 1,500 of whom have been trained to staff R.A.F. ambulance planes. The unit is under the charge of Wing Leader J. M. Cross, London, Ont., and the whole establishment, including the series of tents which form the operating theatre can be taken up, moved and re-established in a few hours. Much of the equipment travels in a truck that fits into the side of the main operating tent and forms an extra room.

It is expected that many of the patients treated by this unit will be wounded fliers though other services brought in for emergency operations and blood transfusion will form a large part of the casualties removed by air.

She attended St. Catharines public schools and the Collegiate Institute.
