Gregory Theatre

About a quarter to four on Saturday afternoon, fire broke out in a projection machine at Gregory Theatre, and in less than three minutes, Mr. R. L. Gregory, proprietor, assisted by Mr. George Alcott, usher, had the building evactuated of two hundred children. About 500 feet of film were burned, but the blaze was soon put out by fire extinguishers. By quickly closing the shutters in the projection room at the time, those in the theatre had no idea a fire had started. The exodus was orderly and without panic.

Mr. Jim Croll of Oakville was running the projection machine at the time the accident occurred. Later in the afternoon the remaining reels were shown on the other machine after the trons who were children for the most part, now all the show.
