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Acting Chief Robb Nabs Robber Suspect

WEEK-END MAN-HUNT ENDS IN ARREST HERE

Acting on information from the Brampton Police Department, Acting Chief of Police Mervyn Robb had an eye for business on Monday morning and nabbed Harold Garfield Lawson, wanted for robbery with violence by the Peel County Police.

Lawson was wanted for robbing and beating John Francis, a farm hand of the Caledon district on Saturday night and escaping with his \$45 roll of bills. All day Sunday police and farmers joined in a man-hunt of the nearby country-side, but Lawson was not located until Monday morning here.

Checking the hotel register on Monday morning and receiving a better description of the wanted man and his new clothing, Acting Chief Robb located Lawson at Hugh's & Mac-

Donald's pool and taken to the Municipal Building where he was questioned by Robb and T. O. Ray Mason, of Acton, and Provincial Constable Ron. Hewitt of Brampton who happened on the scene. Lawson was taken to the Brampton jail after admitting he was the wanted man. He will be charged with robbery with violence.

"He clubbed me on the head twice," said Francis, a farmhand, still dazed by the attack. "I fought him and we kept fighting. He threw me into the creek when he thought he had me knocked out, but I got out and we started fighting again. I wanted to get my money back. Francis said he met an acquaintance near the farm of his employer, Thomas Nesbitt, Caledon. The other, he told Victoria, asked him to walk south to help him fix a car. After walking several miles there was no sign of a car. During the walk Francis bought some candy and peeled off a bill from his roll of \$45. Police think this might have aroused his companion's envy.

According to police the wanted man told Francis he had a cabin in the bush near Victoria. As they went toward the cabin the man took him aside and said he was going to take away his money. Francis received two blows on the head and there was a desperate struggle.

"Not only have I lost a friend," said Francis. "I've lost my money and I've ruined by new suit. It was covered with mud from the river."

Police believe Lawson is wanted in the West for escaping custody.

she was well and happy. So far the unit had had only one patient and he was a dispatch rider who had fallen off his motorcycle. She crossed the channel a couple of days after the invasion started. They had a wonderful crossing. She was quite surprised to see how poorly clothed the people of Normandy were, but they had plenty to eat.

The broadcast was over in a few minutes but nevertheless served to reassure her anxious family here at home. They have had no mail from her for several weeks.

On Thursday evening, the executive of the local branch of the Red Cross held a meeting in the Municipal Building, to discuss plans for the Lifebuoy Follies being held here this week, and also to discuss tentative plans for a Garder-Party some time in August.
LeRoy Dale, K. O., president, reported that the last Red Cross campaign was the most successful ever held in Georgetown. There were 1180 subscribers and a total of \$5066.18 was subscribed. Mr. Dale explained that 85 per cent of all funds raised was sent to Headquarters to be used mainly for prisoners-of-war parcels and the obtaining and shipping of blood plasma. These causes are becoming more urgent as the war progresses and he urged the cooperation of everyone in obtaining as much funds as possible.
Mrs. W. R. Watson, chairman of the Purchasing Committee resigned from office, as she will be leaving town shortly.
