QUEBEC PLUP AND PAPER SAFETY ASSOCIATION

A 7-year safety campaign by Quebec pulp and paper companies has led to woods accident rate in all Canada, Elliott M. Little, of Quebec, general manager of Anglo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Mills, told the Quebec Pulp and Paper Safety Association at a convention here last week.

The rate, which, in costs, represented \$7.04 per \$100 of wages in 1936, dropped to \$2.72 in 1943, said Mr. Little, who paid tribute to the sterling work done Chippewa; Mr. and Mrs. John Wedley poration, chairman of the campaign committee from its creation, and to A. S. Cook, manager of the Association, Mr. Little said:

"In 1937 the very high experience of Sunday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. | 1936 became known. The high cost of accidents in 1936 and its effect on the cost of wood directed attention of the Association and some executives in the industry towards not only the 1936 experience but the high cost also of previous years, and it became apparent that the high rate of woods accidents and the cost in human suffering and in dollars was so alarming as to demand immediate action.

"It was decided that the strongest possible appeal would be made to the chief operating executives of the pulp and paper companies and other pulpwood operators in the Province.

"The results in brief were as follows: ..1936, experience rate 7.04; 1937, 6.76; 1938, 4.93; 1939, 4.89; 1940, 4.39; 1941, 3.59; 1942, 2.90; 1943, 2.72.

"Comparing 1936, the peak year, with 1963, the most recent year, we have: 1-a reduction in experience from 7.04 per cent to 2.72 per cent; 2-An annual saving based on 1943 woods payrolls, of over \$1,200,000; 3-A cumulative saving from 1937 to the end of 1943 of over 4 and one half million dollars, and 4-placed the Province of Quebec in the position of having the best woods accident experience of any Province in

"I am sure you will agree that such a performance is deserving of the highest praise and commendation of which we are capable. However, our average experience over the same period with regard to accidents in our pulp and paper mills as distinct from the woods is unfortunately a different story. The cost of accidents in our pulp and paper mills has been steadily increasing from

1931 to date. "The ones of responsibility for reversing the upward trend of pulp and paper mill accidents and the continuation of the downward trend of woods accidents is right on the doorstep of each one of us, as managers. As far as our pulp and paper mills are concerned, experience of earlier years indicate that we have done better. Therefore. even I we wished we can hardly produce an allbi that would be acceptable. And do not let us think that we here by any means reached the end of to the possibilities of actident prevention
