The financing of the war and the organization of the nation for an all-out war effort has taught us many lessons. In the post-war period we should put into practice the lessons which the war has taught us.

Within the next few days the measure of family allowances is to be introduced by the Prime Minister. Under this measure all of the parents of children under 16 years of age are to be paid family allowances starting at \$6.00 monthly for the first child under 13 years of age and gradually scaling down to \$2.00 per month in the larger families.

This measure is a direct result of our war financing experience and in effect is a transfer of annual wealth from those who do not need it to the heads of families who do need it. The unequal distribution of the national income was one of the major causes of distress during the last depression. This measure is a daring and scientific approach toward a solution of this problem.
