**NOTTAWASAGA FARMER**  
DEED, INMARRIAGE...  
TRACTOR ACCIDENT

Edward Lane, 59, died on Saturday night July 1st, a few hours after a wagon load of hay passed over his body. The unfortunate accident occurred on his farm 2 miles south of Glen Huron, about 3 p.m.

Mr. Lane was driving a tractor drawing a wagon behind which was a hay loader. The load was about completed and the field was hilly. Mr. Lane's two sons were on the wagon building the load. They were going down a steep incline and about half way, down Mr. Lane attempted to turn the tractor to follow the windrow of raked hay, when the tractor was turned at right angles with the loaded wagon the pressure against the tractor caused it to upset. Mr. Lane was thrown clear of the machine which rolled over two or three times. The wagon passed over his body before he had a chance to roll out of the way. It all happened so quickly the two sons hadn't realized anything happened. They found their father under the wagon between the front and back wheels.

Medical aid was summoned from Collingwood, also an ambulance which conveyed the injured man to the G. and M. Hospital. At first it was not realized he was fatally hurt, but about 8 p.m. he passed away.

Mr. Lane was born in Mulmur in 1885, and moved to Nottawasaga in 1906. He married Lillian Georgina Arnold on June 21st, 1916. Besides his wife he is survived by two sons, Harvey and Earl and one daughter, Marion, (Mrs. Lorne Campbell), a grandson Bobby Campbell, three sisters, Mrs. Maude Maxwell, Toronto, Mrs. Katherine McArthur, Creemore, Mrs. Nellie Kennedy, Barrie and one brother, Wesley of Merrifield.

Mr. Lane was a man of upright character and enjoyed the confidence and respect of a large circle of friends. The funeral held from his late residence on Tuesday, was largely attended. The Rev. John Ross officiated at the service in the home and at the grave. The beautiful flowers were carried by nephews, Morley Royal, Brian Arnold, Trevor Baskin, Wesley Lane,

**Stanley McArthur, Maurice Horner and Bert Heatherington.**  
The pallbearers, also six nephews Alvin Gausley, Herman Lane, Orland Arnold, Russell Royal, Wilmot Lane, and Shirley Young.

Mrs. Len. Watson of Georgetown and Mrs. Wm. A. Lane of Limerhouse, cousins of the deceased attended the funeral. Interment was in Creemore Cemetery.—Creemore Star.
