HALTON PROGRESSIVE CONSERVATIVE ASSOC. HOLDS MEETING

What proved to be the most largely attended, enthusiastic and constructive meeting in many years of the Halton Progressive Conservative Association, was held in Milton Town Hall on Thursday evening, July 27.

In fact, with the exception of one or two conventions held over a period of many years, the attendance was larger and the interest more pronounced than ever held in the memory of the oldest party members present.

The occasion marked the first Federal organization, meeting of the Progressive Conservative Party within the County, and its success clearly indicated a determined intention on the part of Halton Progressive Conservatives to place John Bracken at the head of Canadian Government in the next Federal Election.

The meeting was called and presided over by the County Organizer, Allan S. Nicholson, and he must be feeling very gratified and encouraged by the result. Mr. Nicholson reported on the present set-up of the Organization and the work already accomplished, and asked for direction and assistance in completing his task. The meeting expressed unanimous approval of the splendid progress made to date by Mr. Nicholson, and then got seriously down to business.

A large attendance of ladies assured the Organizer that the ladies of the County would see that the Women's Organization, within the County would be completed at once, and expanded to a degree never before attempted by them.

It was agreed that a vigorous challenge would be issued to the younger Progressive Conservatives within the Organization, and that the Chairman of each Ward Organization would be authorized to appoint from this group two Vice-Chairmen consisting of a young woman. Plans were also laid for the development of a County Group of Junior Progressive Conservatives.

A strong finance committee was appointed consisting of the Vice-President from each Municipal and Township Division and the appointment of a Committee to interview potential candidates was referred to the Executive Committee for early action.
