HUGHES CLEAVER

The main debate on the family allowance bill is over. When the vote was taken the Conservative members withdrew their opposition and supported the bill, excepting one member who was paired.

When notice of this measure was first given some weeks ago and before the bill was printed, many Conservative newspapers and Mr. Bracken strenuously opposed it on three grounds:

- (1) It was a bribe to the electors.
- (2) It favoured French Canada.
- (3) Its benefits would not reach the children.

The bill fully safeguards against any of these things happening. So since reading the bill and as a result of the debate on it, all of the above arguments were found to be groundless and all the members of the House of Commons (except one) voted for the bill. How much better it would have been had the critics waited until they knew what they were criticizing.
