1. IT IS A BRIBE TO THE ELECTORS:

Every well-to-do person receives a reduction from his income tax of \$150 yearly for his wife and \$108 yearly for every child under eighteen. This is \$9 per month per child. These deductions from knoome tax have been in force for many years and no one considers them a bribe or a dole. The Family Allowance measure simply extends this principle to the low income groups who do not earn enough wages to profit by the income tax deductions for children. In the light of these facts just what do you think of the argument that this Family Allowance is a dole or a bribe?


