The session which has just finished passed many measures looking to the postwar period. In addition to the establishment of an industrial Bank to assist small industries there is a measure to finance Export Credits. In agriculture medium term bank credits for farmers should be of great assistance to both farmers and industry. The 200 million dollars voted to sustain floor prices for farm products will prevent any drastic drop in prices of farm production.

One of the outstanding pieces of legislation, designed to furnish employment in the postwar period is the new Housing Act. The interest rate has been reduced to 4 1/2 per cent. The down payment to be paid by owner is now 10 per cent on the first \$2000; then 15 per cent on the next \$2000. Provision is made for term insurance so that in the event of the death of the breadwinner the widow will own the home clear of encumbrance. Provision is now made so that an owner will be allowed for work which he does on his own home also under the new act men may club together to help build homes for each other. We now have a shortage of 300 thousand homes. Under the new act a drive should be made for every man to own his own home and this is now possible for practically everyone. A home costing \$4000 the down payment is just \$400 and the monthly payments are just over \$18, cheaper not rent.
