and then he gave as his reason for this outburst the following: "Many millions of dollars from the pockets of the people of Ontario would go to the Province of Quebec under the measure."

Premier Drew was apparently so anxious to take a crack at the King Government that he was careless about his facts. The following are the figures.

	Pay Taxes	Receives Family Allowances
Ontario	50.3%	32%
Quebec	31.1	32
Maritimes	8.7	10
Western Provinces	14.6	26

From the above figures it is obvious that Quebec pays as much as she receives and Ontario Drew's quarrel is with the Maritimes and the Western Provinces which will receive twice as much as they pay in taxes. The West has already been heard from. The fact that Ontario has the head offices of many large corporations and consequently gets the credit for the taxes these companies pay is no proof that the money is all earned in Ontario. The Massey Harris Company is a good example of the fallacy of this argument.
