



HUGHES CLEAVER

The Toronto Globe and Mail of August 22nd published as a news item a complete statement of Canada's Armed Forces by Provinces and then a couple of days later appeared an editorial which badly garbled the facts about Quebec.

No one deplores the French Canada problem more than I do but I suggest that during the stress of war is no time to either aggravate it or attempt to cure the problem.

The following are the official figures of Quebec's enlistments:

All of the above have enlisted for service overseas. While this total is little more than half of what it should be to equal the record of the rest of Canada yet it is a substantial force. When war came we did not create the problem. It was already there, and we have simply done the best we could under the circumstances. This problem of two races and two languages must be courageously tackled when the war is over. This country has a record of which all Canadians should be proud and I believe that a standard Canadian History Text Book to be taught in all schools across Canada would be of great assistance. While it is true that Great Britain did conquer French Canada it is equally true that all people in this country have been treated fairly and no one has been oppressed. The suggestion made by the I. O. D. E. that both languages should be taught in all of our schools I believe a helpful uggestion.

In fairness I should add that the Zombies are not all from French Canada. Ontario has 41,000 compared to Quebec's 46,000 and it should further be added that 17,000 of Ontario's draftees went active and only 6,000 of the Quebec draftees.
