### CHRISTIE STREET HOSPITAL AT TORONTO

The Toronto Globe & Mail has recently tried to stir up a lot of partisan criticism with respect to this hospital. As a matter of fact the Brant Military Hospital at Burlington was a beautifully located hospital on the lakefront at Burlington and should not have been closed. After the last war at the request of Toronto M.P.'s and Toronto doctors the Union Government which then was in office established the Christie Street Hospital and closed the Brant Hospital.

It was never the intention of the present government that the Christie Street Hospital should become a permanent hospital for our veterans of this war. On account of the present shortage of both manpower and materials it was not thought wise to embark on the building of a ten million dollar hospital in wartime.

A new suitable site has been donated by the City of Toronto and a contract for the first unit of the new hospital was awarded some months ago but the Globe & Mail still keeps up the agitation and conveniently overlooks the fact that this type of a building cannot be built in a few weeks time like much of the mushroom type of war construction work which we have done. This type of criticism is just another example of the type co-operation which this newspaper has given to Canada's War Government ever since its pet idea of a National Government was repudiated so decisively by the electors in 1940.
