**Wm. F. Gray, Erin
Died Last Week**

The community was shocked by the news of the sudden death of William F. Gray, who passed away at Hillsburgh, on Friday, September 16, 1944. Born in Erin Township, on July 29, 1900, he is a son of Daniel Gray and the late Mrs. Gray, Hillsburgh. On November 28, 1933, he united in marriage with Anna Mae Hawes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Hawes of East Garafraxa, who survives. He is also survived by four children—Marlyn, Ivan, Franklin and Joan Elizabeth; three brothers: Ivan, of Toronto; Frank and Douglas of Hillsburgh and one sister, Mrs. Burt, of Toronto.

Twenty-four years ago he commenced the Gray Apiaries which he developed to an extensive business, having established yards covering the district from Elora to Weston, with an extracting plant at Hillsburgh. In the interval he acquired two farms, his recent investment being the Lindsay farm on the seventh line, Erin which he was developing into an attractive home. He was a member of St. Andrew's Church, Hillsburgh and of Wellington Lodge A. F. & A. M. No. 271.

The funeral took place from his late residence, on Sunday afternoon, when Rev. W. D. Turner conducted the obsequies in the presence of a very large assembly of relatives, friends and business associates. Interment was made at Huxley Cemetery where following the committal service, the Masonic Brethren conducted their burial ceremony.
