F.O. Dave Crichton Home from Ceylon

Having completed a thousand operational flying hours, Flying Officer David Crichton is home on a month's furlough, after serving in the Far East and Coylon for the past two years and prior to that, in England for a year. He and his wife, of Toronto, are visiting Mr. and Mrs. D. P. Crichton this week.

There was a period of nearly a year, when his wife and parents had no word of him or from him. At that time Dave was stationed in Singapore (Feb. 1942) when the ill-starred Hong Kong Canadian Expeditionary Force was practically wiped out and the Japanese overran the islands of the Pacific. He was attached to the RAP in a Catalina Plying Boat Squadron. A couple of days before Singapore sotually fell, two or three flying boats got away to Batavia, in the Dutch Bast Indies. Dave says they operated between them and Sumatra for several weeks, before the Japs caught up with them again. By this time the planes were gone and the crew boarded a tramp steamer. As it happened Ceylon was its destination. Shortly after the boys landed there, RAF reinforcements were sent out and except for a short period when he was stationed in Aaden, Arabia and Egypt, F.O. Crichton has been there ever

The airforce station in Ceylon is situated in the jungle and except when they make a trip into the island's city of Columbo, which is a very modern and up-to-date place, life is very dull, cut off as they are from civilization. Dave mentioned this fact particularly, as they feel the lack of reading matter from Conada, newspapers and magazines. They're able to get English papers, but the Canadian literature apparently doesn't get through. Entertainment facilities at the camp are very poor and the non-commissioned ranks who cannot afford the city entertainment have a very lonesome, monotonous time of it

The natives of Ceylon are very friendly, said P.O. Crichton, and the food is good. The lack of meat in the diet is noticeable, however, for they don't believe in killing animals for cating purposes. Pineapples, bananas are especially abundant and plenty of rice is served.

The air-letter mail service between Canada and India takes about a month, but often surface-mail letters and parcels do not arrive in nearly that time.

Patrolling the seas around Ceylon, Dave says they have often encountered Japanese fighters. They are not very good marksmen, but are very daring in combat. At first our men were at a disadvantage because of the superiority in equipment and more up-to-date planes. This has to s large extent been remedied.

Dave had a good trip home, coming by way of England and stopping off there for a few days before embarking for Canada. He arrived in Georgetown on Tuesday night last week. P.O. Crichton enlisted in the RCAP
