### IN CASE YOU ARE INTERESTED

The report recently tabled in the House of Commons by the special committee on War Expenditures contained a very important recommendation, with respect to the synthetic rubber plant at Sarnia. When Japanese conquests in the Far East cut off Canada's supply of crude rubber it became necessary for Canada to produce synthetic rubber. At a cost of about fifty million dollars Canada built and owns a plant at Samia which is now producing rubber at a volume sufficient for our post war needs. Present production costs indicate that this plant can produce rubber at a cost competitive with crude rubber. The committee recommended that ownership of this plant should be retained by the government in the postwar period.

This report was opposed by the Conservative members of the committee.
