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Executive Chosen for Seventh Victory Loan Campaign

FLECK AND BRADLEY AGAIN JOINT CHAIRMEN-HALTON OB-JECTIVE INCREASED BY \$100,000 -GEORGETOWN DISTRICT BY \$15,000.

A meeting was held in the Municipal Building last Thursday night when plans were made and committee chairmen appointed for the forthcoming 7th Victory Loan drive, L. E. Fleck, joint chairman with W. Bradley for the last Loan acted as chairman for the evening, and Thos. Eason, Jr. acted as secretary.

Mr. Bickell, Halton County organizer, spoke briefly about the splendid ahowing made by Halton County in all previous loans. He pointed out that with the exception of one Loan, and not counting the city of Toronto. the amount of money subscribed in Halton was the highest per capita in the province. In particular, he stressed the outstanding part Georgetown had played and gave warm praise to last Spring's smooth-functioning district committee.

Major McCleary, an associate of Mr. Bickell's, was also present and showed slides giving the reasons for Victory Loans prepared by the Coca Cola Company and narrated by Napler Moore, editor of MacLean's Magazine. These slides were particularly compelling and it is hoped that every citizen will have an opportunity of seeing them during the course of the next few weeks.
