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## Executive Chosen for Seventh Victory Loan Campaign

**FLECK AND BRADLEY AGAIN JOINT CHAIRMEN—HALTON OBJECTIVE INCREASED BY \$100,000—GEORGETOWN DISTRICT BY \$15,000.**

A meeting was held in the Municipal Building last Thursday night, when plans were made and committee chairmen appointed for the forthcoming 7th Victory Loan drive. L. E. Fleck, joint chairman with W. F. Bradley for the last Loan acted as chairman for the evening, and Thos. Eason, Jr. acted as secretary.

Mr. Bickell, Halton County organizer, spoke briefly about the splendid showing made by Halton County in all previous loans. He pointed out that with the exception of one Loan, and not counting the city of Toronto, the amount of money subscribed in Halton was the highest per capita in the province. In particular, he stressed the outstanding part Georgetown had played and gave warm praise to last Spring's smooth-functioning district committee.

Major McCleary, an associate of Mr. Bickell's, was also present and showed slides giving the reasons for Victory Loans prepared by the Coca Cola Company and narrated by Napier Moore, editor of McCleary's Magazine. These slides were particularly compelling and it is hoped that every citizen will have an opportunity of seeing them during the course of the next few weeks.

### Quotas Increased

With the total amount of the 7th Victory Loan increased by one hundred million dollars over the last Loan, each district is being asked to bear a portion of this increase. This time, Halton County will be asked to raise their objective by \$100,000, and \$15,000 of this will be the share of the Georgetown district. It was pointed out that since "D" Day, war expenses have exceeded the budget figures by four hundred million dollars, a staggering amount but one which must be paid for victory.

### Committee Chairmen Chosen

It was unanimously agreed, that in view of the splendid results in the 6th Victory Loan, that the organization be kept intact if possible for this campaign. L. E. Fleck and W. F. Bradley will continue as joint chairmen, with Ralph Ross Honorary Chairman, E. V. MacCormack will again serve as chairman of the Canvass committee, but due to pressure of business felt he would need some assistance, so LeRoy Dale has consented to act jointly with him as chairman of this important committee.

R. B. Foulis, veteran chairman of the group payroll committee, will again act in this capacity. Mr. Foulis has been payroll chairman in every loan. The resignation of Walter Carpenter as publicity chairman was accepted with regret and this post will be filled by Sid Silver.

### Sales Meeting in Brampton

A meeting of salesmen from Halton, Peel and Dufferin Counties is being held this week in Brampton, when the Minister of Finance, Hon. J. L. Halsey, will give facts and figures about the Loan and Canada's war effort. The local selling organization will probably be the same as in the last campaign. Monday, October 23rd, is the opening day of the three-week campaign when the salesmen will begin making their rounds and urging every resident to invest in the most important job ahead—the winning of the war.

## Letter to Halton County Citizens

Oakville, Oct. 16th, 1944.

Citizens of Halton County. Ladies and Gentlemen:

Our Government is calling upon Canadians to subscribe to a Loan to finance the War.

Much has happened in the past months to make us glad and thankful that we had a hand in making the last Loan a success. Today final Victory is assured if there is no weakening in our efforts, both at home and on the fighting front. We know that our Soldiers, Sailors and Airmen are doing their part nobly, and we must not falter in our duty to them and to ourselves.

Subscriptions to the new Loan will open on the 23rd instant and will continue for three weeks. The minimum amount required by the Government is \$1,380,000,000, an increase of \$100,000,000 over the objective of our last Loan. This means that all of us must increase our subscriptions. It is our duty as well as our high privilege to have a part in this task. You can aid by thinking, talking and working for the success of the Campaign.

Word was received last Wednesday by his wife (the former Evelyn Sanderson) that Pte. George K. Greensward was missing on September 28, Pte. Greensward is the son of Mr. Albert Greensward of Brampton. He has been serving in Italy since November, 1943.

According to letters received shortly before the cable came, Pte. Greensward had been in hospital suffering from an attack of malaria. He was discharged from hospital and had been in action six days when he became missing.

George enlisted with the Lorne Scots in 1942. He was trained at Guelph, during which time he was transferred to the Irish Regiment of Canada. From Guelph he went to Debert, N.S., and thence overseas, in November, 1942. The following November he left England for Italy.
