### The War Service Gratuity and Re-establishment Credit — OTHER ASSISTANCE AFTER DISCHARGE

The Canadian re-establishment program gives discharged members of the services assistance under a wide variety of measures during the period when they are deciding their future as civilians.

#### THE WAR SERVICE GRATUITY

This became law at the last session of Parliament, and provides, after discharge, monthly payments to those honorably discharged, who enlisted for service anywhere, and to those who saw service in the Aleutian Islands, for their period of service there. It provides a basic gratuity of \$7.50 for each 30 days' service in the Western Hemisphere and \$15.00 for each 30 days' service overseas. A supplementary gratuity of seven days' pay and allowances, with Canadian subsistence allowance, is paid for each six months' overseas service. Other places in the Aleutian Islands and any other theatre of war is overseas service. Other places in the Western Hemisphere are not. Aircrew, flying outside the Canadian waters, or stationed outside Canada or the United States, and Naval personnel in sea-going ships of war are regarded as on overseas service.

Monthly payments not exceeding monthly pay and allowances last received will start after January 1, 1945, unless the Act is proclaimed earlier.

#### RE-ESTABLISHMENT CREDIT

A re-establishment credit, equal to the basic gratuity shown above, and not including the supplementary one is available in the 10 years following discharge for constructive purposes such as purchase of a home, business, furniture or tools, or payment of premiums under Government life insurance. It can also be used for modernizing or repairing a home, for working capital of a business and other similar purposes. The re-establishment credit is reduced by any grants paid while training or continuing education, or by grants paid under the Veterans' Land Act. Training, education and Veterans' Land Act grants cannot be paid if the re-establishment credit is used, unless an adjustment is made.

#### AT DISCHARGE

At discharge every man and woman is advised of the re-establishment program, is given a complete medical and dental examination, and may receive free treatment for any condition shown by the examination, in the year following discharge. They are allowed to retain one uniform and certain other service clothing. All discharged since August 1, 1944, receive a \$100 civilian clothing allowance and if they have 183 days' service and receive an honorable discharge, a rehabilitation grant of 30 days' pay and one month's dependents allowance. They also receive a railway warrant to their home or place of enlistment.

#### AFTER DISCHARGE

Service personnel seeking employment apply through Employment and Selective Service, but in many offices they will find Veterans' Welfare Officers and other specially trained staff ready to assist them. Veterans who wish to return to their former civilian positions are entitled to reinstatement in that position, if the job still exists, if they are capable of filling it, and if application is made within three months of discharge. Under the law of Canada every ex-service man or woman with overseas service, or disability pensioners, receive preference in Civil Service appointments if qualified for the position for which they apply.

### District Governor's Night at Lions Club

District Governor Lou Whitaker, of Welland, was a guest of Georgetown Lions Club at their dinner meeting in the McGibbon House last Monday. Introduced by Lion Chief LeRoy Dale and District Secretary Bruce Malcolm, Mr. Whitaker traced the growth of Lionism since it was founded in 1917 by Melville Jones of Chicago. At present there are some 4600 clubs in 14 countries, with total membership of almost 180,000. In Canada there are 164 clubs, each of them playing an important part in welfare and war work.

Treasurer Dick Licata of the local Club presented the District Governor with a cheque for \$100.00, as a donation to the Lions British Child War Victims' Fund. Another interesting feature of the meeting was the presentation to Lion Ralph Ross of his Past President's button. This was made by Deputy District Governor Reg. Everett, of Port Credit, who spoke of the good work accomplished by the Club since Lion Ross's term of office. "Sometimes we are inclined to think of past members of the executive as 'has-beens'," he said, "but in reality they are the back-bone of any club."

Guests were also present at the meeting from Hamilton, Oakville and Sudbury.

### MISS G. STAPLES ADDRESSES W.M.S. THANK-OFFERING MEETING LAST WEDNESDAY

The Autumn Thankoffering meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society of The Georgetown United Church was held on Wednesday afternoon, October 11th at 3 o'clock. The President, Mrs. A. M. Nielsen was in the chair. A remembrance service was held in memory of Mrs. Ellen MacKay, who passed away since the last meeting. Mrs. Nielsen spoke of her faithfulness in attendance and interest in Missionary work and of how much she will be missed in the church. The hymn of which the first line is "We cannot think of them as dead" was sung and Mrs. Tyndall read a suitable poem.

Mrs. Houston, the new superintendent of Cedarvale School, was in charge of the devotional part of the program. After the business, Mrs. Francis Thompson sang a lovely solo, appropriate to Thanksgiving. The speaker was Miss G. Staples, on furlough in Toronto. She has been serving in the Mission Schools in Western Canada for 10 years in Indian work—for six years in Pile Hills School, Saskatchewan. For some time she has been in charge of the sewing room there. She spoke of the pioneers and their contact with the Red Men—the Indians, of their struggle to build new homes and their spirit of thanksgiving when they were established—of how their thankfulness to God influenced the Indians and how at last the Indians and white men joined in services. She gave a most thoughtful and interesting description of the school and farm—all the various buildings necessary to the work of training the Indian boys and girls. She said the goal was to develop the children, and fit them to be healthy, intelligent, Christian citizens. She pictured 100 happy boys and girls trained for farm and house-work. They receive spiritual guidance and knowledge of the Bible. The teachers need strength of purpose and love, judgment and patience, insight and wisdom. She asked for the prayers of those present that their labors might be blessed.

Mrs. A. R. Speight thanked all those who had contributed to the program. The November meeting will be a joint meeting of the Mission Circle and the Woman's Missionary Society.
