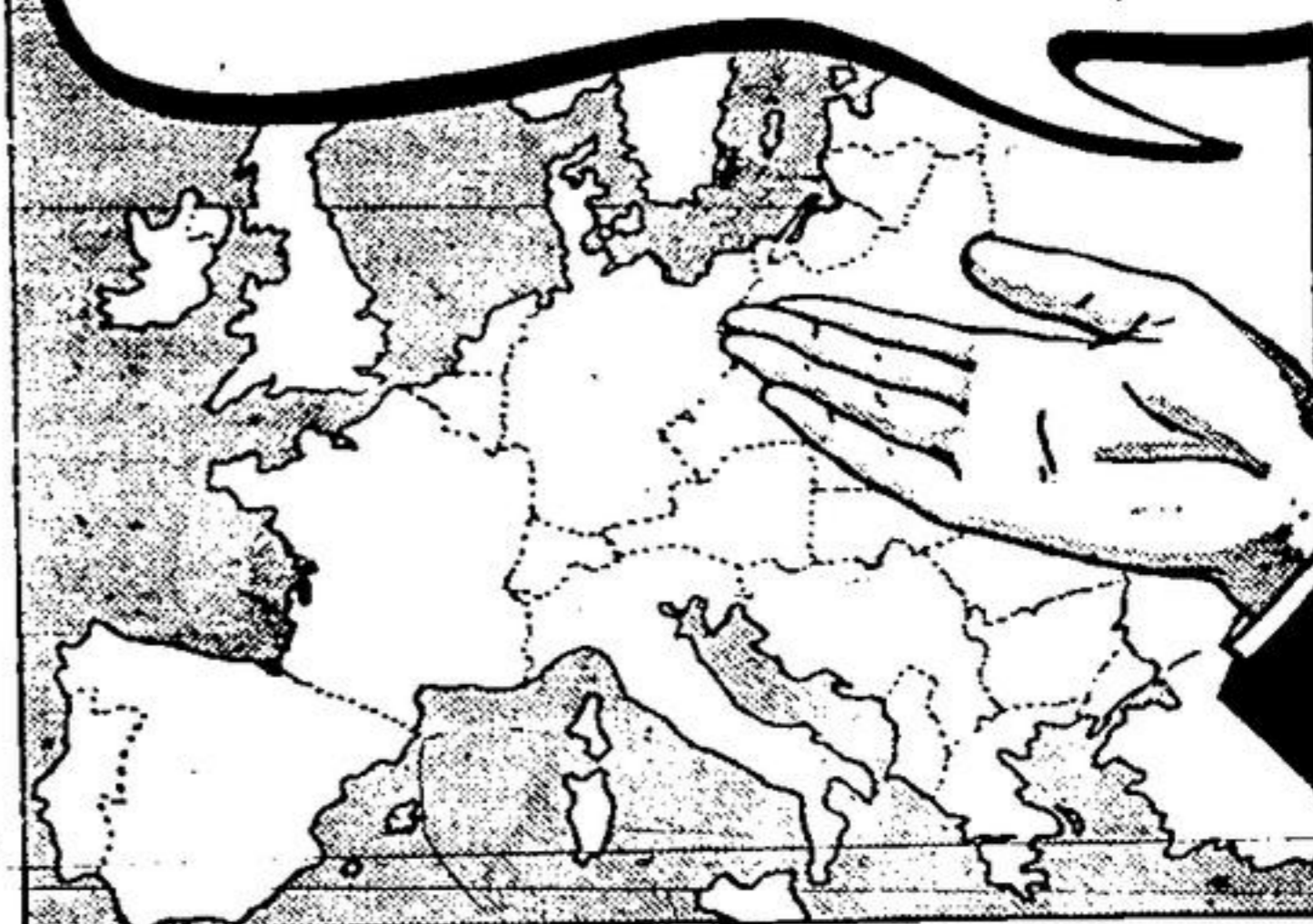
Mr. Vincent Bottom spent the week end at his home in Toronto. Mrs. G. Eaves, who spent a few days with friends at Cooksville, has returned home.
