She was the second daughter of a family of twelve of whom Mrs. Wm. Bingham of Alma and Isaac of Georgetown survive. Besides these left to mourn her passing are her sorrowing husband, her sister-in-law, Miss Althertha Conover and many nieces and nephews by whom "Aunt Susie" will always be dearly remembered.
