He was in the Sicily invasion and is now in the thick of things in Italy.

**THE FORGOTTEN MEN OF FIRST CANADIAN DIVISION**

Way back when — in 'Thirty-nine, Jobs were good and times were fine; We left our homes, our friends, our wives, We offered our youth, our courage, our lives. We left our homes for foreign lands, Mid laughter and tears and shaking of hands;

"We'll never forget you," our friends all cried, In our tender memory you will always abide, We reached old England and found her swell,

We were welcomed royally, I'm here to tell; With letters from friends and folks at home,

We didn't care how far we roamed, We tired England and waited the day, A chance our part in the war to play; Parcels came and we all felt good, In spite of England's rain and mud, Time went by and the novelty wore, We'd never leave home again we swore,
