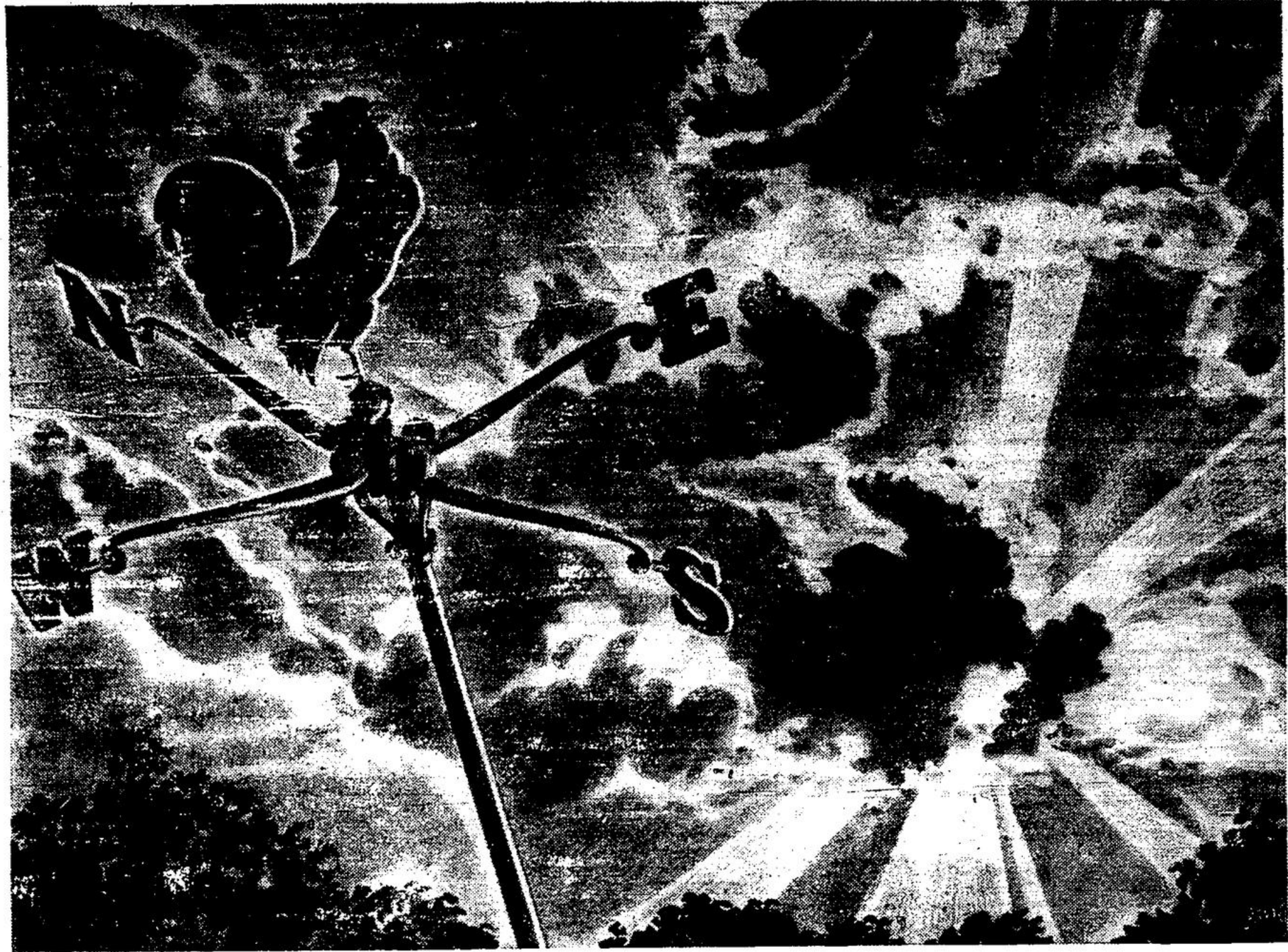
There is another real estate transfer pending in our hamlet of which fuller particulars will be given later. Watch Terra Cotta grow!

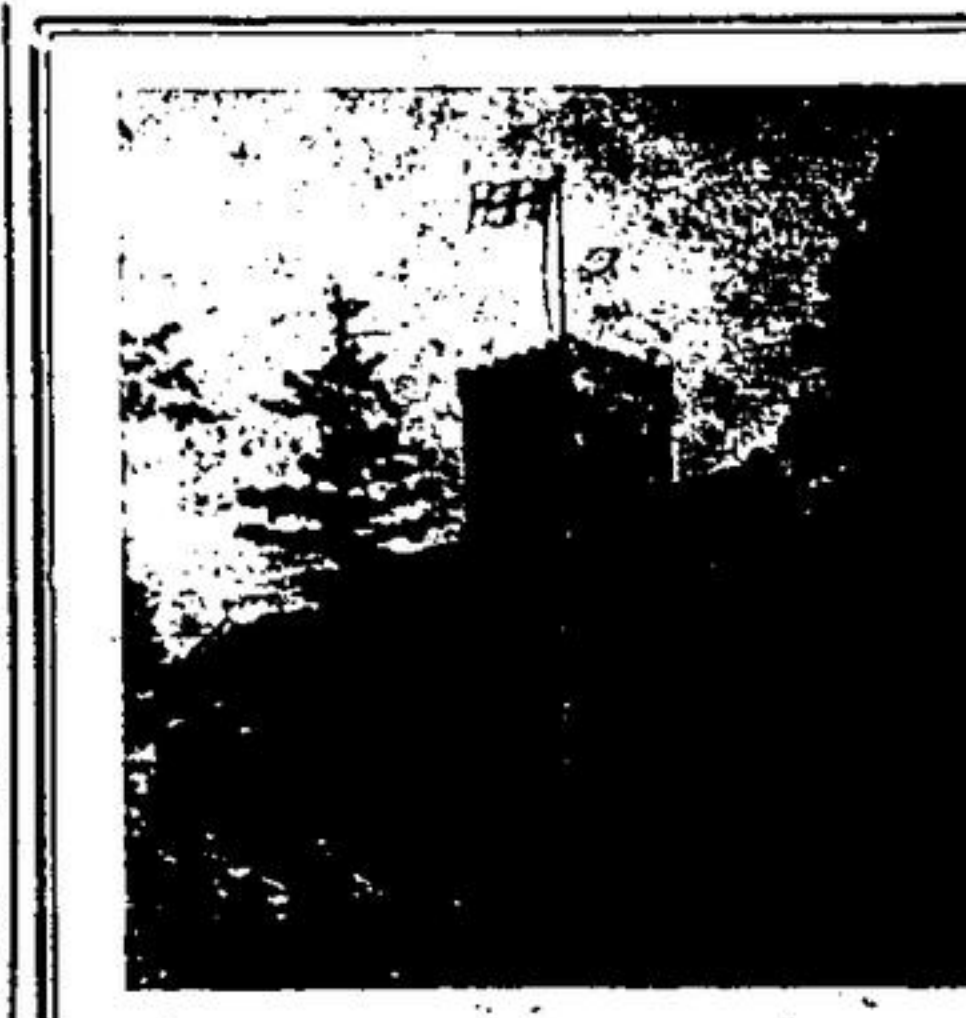
We are glad to know that little Elaine Madill, who has been very ill for the past week, is improving.
