Smith & Stone Have Some World Travellers

When a man serves his country in two wars he's done about all that can be expected of any citizen.

When his service in the present war embraces army, merchant marine and war plant service the record is even whiter.

And when that service carries him around the world he's really worth a story... so meet Alf Collins of Smith & Stone, Ltd.

Alf's parents brought him to Canada when he was a lad of six and they came to Georgetown where the father worked on the railway.

During the last war Alf was about as big as he is now so, while under age, he joined the 72nd Battery RHA and served on the East Coast.

Soon afterwards he met Annie Jewell, of Toronto, and they were married. Mrs. Collins is now doing her bit in the same plant as Alf. They have one son and one daughter.

A few weeks after the present struggle broke out in 1939 Alf enlisted in

the Lorne Scots, but like many another he was tagged with the label "too old". In the last war it was "too young" and in this one the reverse.

So Collins worked in such military spots as Toronto, Ottawa, Hamilton and Camp Borden without getting overseas, and after 47 months of it was discharged on medical grounds.

Collins already had 11 years service at Smith & Stone and could have stepped in where he left off, but he had a hankering for the sea. Without experience Collins offered himself to the merchant marine. They

tagged him with that same label "too young" but said that if Collins could cook he was as good as enlisted, there and then.

The night he came home to tell of these adventures his son Bruce, already excited at the prospect of a sea going life, decided to enlist at once. He too had been working at Smith & Stone, but is now at sea.

Collins' only daughter, Elaine, recently had a daughter which makes Alf a grandfather at 43.

Incidentally, around the Collins home it's mother who does the cooking.

Another cook to see a spot of the

world is Bill Emmerson, guard at the plant, who has been everything from a section hand to a cop to a mail carrier.

For four years during the last war Bill was a cook with the Durham Light Infantry of the Imperial Army. The very week this war started Bill got in again as cook to the officers of the Lorne Scots. However, his age caught up with him and he went to work for Smith & Stone where his three sons were all busy.

All three have since enlisted and as any white man ever gets to the Holy Mohammedan city of Mecca, which is about 12 miles inland, Collins got there twice.

But when he reached such famed Indian ports as Colombo, Karachi, and Calcutta, the old complaint that had caused him to be discharged from the army began to bother him again and Collins was a pretty sick man.

He started the homeward voyage, but when he reached Port Said, which is sometimes called the cesspool of the East, he was put ashore too ill



to work. Collins made a pretty fair recovery there and was taken aboard another ship, but that one only took him as far as Algiers, which, by now, was aswarm with Americans.

From Algiers he got back to Britain and from Britain back to Georgetown, gone away to war, two with the navy and one with the Lorne Scots.

A fourth son, Bill Junior has come to help take their place but Bill too is anxious to be away to the fighting the minute he's old enough.

The motto of all this seems to add up to the slogan "Learn cooking and see the world."
