Mrs. Cleave's other son, Leading Seaman Franklin, wrote home that while on the last day of his leave in Edinburgh, Scotland, he met Lt. Herb. Reid, in the Canadian Club there. They had a grand chat and were able to spend the day together, before returning to their respective bases the next day.

Mrs. Garfield McGillivray has received word that her brother, Cfn. E. J. Querin, who was with the Ordnance Field Workshop, is now in hospital in England after serving in France. He did not state why he was in hospital, and the only hint that he might have been wounded in action, was that he said his brother, Cfn. Joe Querin, also serving in the same unit, was still alright. A few days previous Mrs. McGillivray had received a Christmas gift of perfume and powder from her brother in France.

Tpr. R. N. Harley landed in England on October 21st. Ray enlisted in November, 1943, and trained at Brampton, New Glasgow, N.S., and Camp Borden before being sent overseas.

News has been received from Capt. Bob Bruyns, son of Mr. A. G. M. Bruyns. Capt. Bruyns is serving in Paramaribo, Surinam, Dutch Guiana, after escaping unhurt from the Japanese in Java, he was badly injured in a traffic accident several weeks ago. 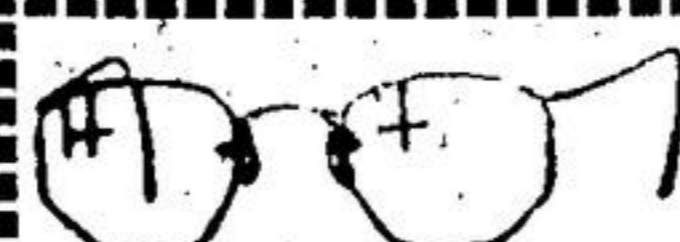
