HOME-MADE BAKED BEANS

HOME-BAKED BEANS

Look over and wash well 1 pound dried navy beans; cover with cold water and let stand over night. Bring to boil, and simmer 1/2 hour. Drain and turn into soup-pan. Add 1 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 peeled small whole onion, 1/2 pound smoked or salt pork or "bacon squares" cut in pieces (the conventional smoked pig's cheek), 1/2 cup light or packed brown sugar or molasses or 1/4 cup corn syrup; add boiling water to cover. Cover and bake in slow oven, 300 degrees, about 2 hours. Unless salt pork is used, add 1/2 teaspoon salt dissolved in 1/2 cup of the boiling water. Complete baking (about 3 hours longer). During baking, add water as necessary to keep beans moist, uncover toward end of cooking to allow the top to crisp.
