Georgetown Soldiers Busy Lads

When It Comes to Writing Home

Either Georgetown's warrior sons are the busiest letter writers from any town in Canada, or Canadian soldiers as a whole are the world's leading correspondents.

I don't know which, but I do know that the girls at Smith & Stone whose husbands are overseas average better than one letter each second day from the absent men.

Par among the girls I talked to would be 190 letters a year, and one girl has already got 400 letters this year. She even answered them all!

Here's a list of the Smith & Stone girls whose husbands are overseas, or have been overseas. There is an equal number whose husbands are in uniform but still in Canada.

Norma Forster, wife of Driver Richard Forster of the RCASC. Norma and Dick were married three years ago and Dick has been away two of those three years. She started to work at Smith & Stone two months after he left.

Gene Law's husband is a first-class stoker aboard HMCS Strathadam, a

modern frigate. She's been married 7 years and worked at S & S for 11 years, but seven come eleven doesn't mean a thing to her.

Edith Clark's husband Cyril, recently returned to Georgetown after three years' service with the Saskatoon Light Infantry in Britain and Italy. An illness suffered in Italy left him temporarily paralyzed but Cyril, a home town Georgetown man, is likely to make full recovery.

Margaret Puckering is a Georgetown girl who worked for S & S before marrying Lovell Puckering and returned to the plant when he went overseas. Lovell is a sergeant with the Perth Regiment and has been in Italy about a year.

Jean Miller had also worked at the plant before she married Morris Miller who is now in Italy with the medical corps.

Of all the service men's wives now at the plant Mrs. Miller is the only one with a child or children. Jean has a boy who is year and a bit old. Her husband has never seen his son.

At last reports Elsie King's husband, Percy King, was in Holland as a machine gunner with the Toronto

Scottish. At the time of their marriage, about 21 months ago, Percy was already in the army. Elsie and Percy are both Georgetowners born and raised.

Naturally all of those absent fighting men have had Christmas boxes sent to them. In fact they've had boxes sent with regularity, and the flow of mail has been almost a record. I didn't ask if they were all love letters, because it was none of my business, but the general underlying idea seems to be that those letters are pretty affectionate, as well they should be.

Margaret Martin and Beesie Harrison are two other S and S girls whose husbands have been . . . and still are . . . overseas in the cause of their country. I didn't ask them any details in connection with this story because I've written about them in other articles. Fred Harrison recently won the Military Medal, in Italy.

Other S and S girls whose husbands are in uniform but not yet away from Canada include: Jessie Martin, Ethel Arthurs, Doris Allen, Margaret Malone, Audrey Sharpe and Jean King.
