After partaking of a delicious supper served by the hostess, assisted by Mrs. Audrey Sharpe, the group was called to order by the Divisional Supt. Mrs. Giesva. Mrs. Peck then read the following address:

Dear Wren Blick, and Fellow-Members of the Georgetown Nursing Division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade:

Sarah, you have been an active member of our Brigade since its inception up to such time as your having enlisted in the Wrens, and we wish to express to you in a tangible way our appreciation of your co-operation and keen interest you still take in our Brigade, when it is your opportunity to do so; and having had the honor to be chosen for service overseas, we wish you to accept this pen from the members of the Georgetown St. John Nursing Division in remembrance of the pleasant meetings we have had together. We would be happy to receive a few lines from you when you have time to spare.

May God bless you in your new environments, may health and happiness be yours as you go out from your native shores.

CAPE LYNN WILSON, WOUNDED OVERSEAS RETURNS HOME

Many Georgetown people will remember the K. L. Wilson's, and be glad to know that their son, Captain Lynn Wilson, now of McRae Drive, Leaside, has safely returned from overseas, after several narrow escapes, and after being severely wounded. Mr. and Mrs. K. L. Wilson lived in Georgetown for many years while Mr. Wilson was accountant in the Bank of Montreal, and Captain Lynn Wilson was also associated with the bank here as well as in Brampton, Simcoe and Toronto, before enlisting.

Captain Wilson was only 20 feet away when his sergeant-major was killed by machine-gun bullets from a Nazi plane which strafed their armored column. Now Capt. Wilson is home with shrapnel wounds in his right leg and arm, received when an aerial bomb exploded near him about the same moment as an enemy shell. "I don't know which hit me," he declared.

Wilson went into France June 18th with the 4th Canadian Armored Division. He was wounded July 26 but he saw plenty of action.

"We ran into heavy fighting around Caen and our casualties were heavy," he continued. "I'll never forget the expressions on the faces of 1800 people we evacuated from the crypt of Caen cathedral. At first they looked at us as if we were a bother to them, upsetting their routine, but soon afterwards they became very friendly, even offering us the hospitality of their homes.

"Another thing I'll always remember was the terrific job of handling traffic leading to and from the dock areas. You've never seen anything like the congestion yet everything was run like clock-work. They worked out a wonderful control of circuits and one-way roads—it was a great piece of organization."

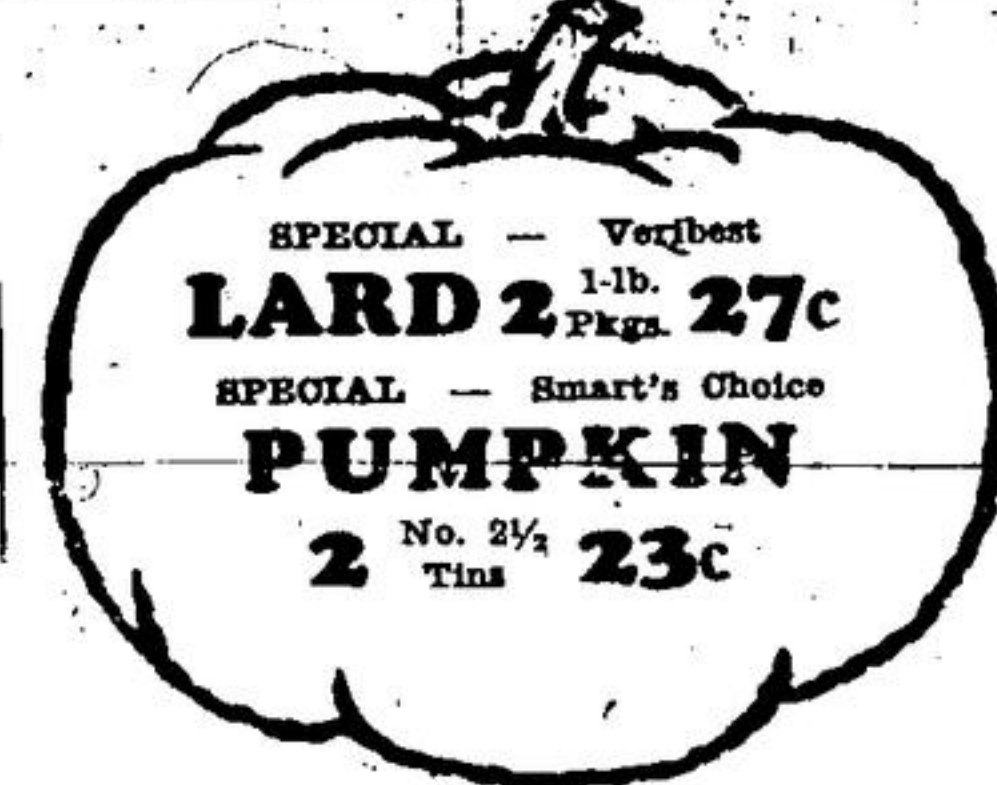
