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Final Session of 1944 Council Held Last Thursday Night

Alf Collins Hired as Town Employee -Streets will be Snow-ploughed-December 26th Procisimed as Boxing Day Holiday.

Council was held last Thursday in the Municipal Building, with Mayor Harold Cleave, Reeve K. R. MacDonald and Councillors McGilvray, Bradley, Lyons, Orr and Thompson present, Several items of routine year-end business were dealt with, including the pessing of the usual \$500 grant to the Fire Brigade and instructions to the Town Clerk to pay any bills received up to the year-end, upon the authorisation of the Finance Committee.

New Town Employee

Mr. Alfred Collins was hired as permanent town employee at a wage rate of 60c per hour.

Mr. H L Hutt waited on Council and requested that ashes, collected with the garbage, be dumped as a fill on the roadway into his property, in order to create a proper town road at no cost. Some work was done on this last winter, and Mr. Hutt believed that a couple of months this winter would finish the job. The matter was left with Chief Marshall and the work will be done under his supervision

Streets to Be Pleughed The Council decided to hire Mr. Art Scott to do necessary ploughing of snow on the streets at a charge of \$3 an hour. It was also decided to purchase a quantity of snow fence, to be placed on Papermill Row to stop the roadway from drifting. This winter, street sanding will be done by Bob Lane.

It was decided to proclaim December 26th a Boxing Day holiday, acting on a request from the Retail Division of the Board of Trade, Cr. McGilvray suggested that some coat racks be installed in the Municipal Building for the convenience of public gatherings, and this will be done.

Some discussion took place on the purchase of a town truck, and while no definite decisions were reached, it was decided to apply for a purchase permit from the Oil Controller's Office so that if and when Council decides to purchase one, the preliminary work will have been done.

There was also an informal discussion about sidewalk shovelling by the citizens. Cr. Orr wondered if a onehorse plow could not be procured, as in some towns, and enquiries will be made along this line. The Council thought that citizens should be reminded of their individual duty in keeping their sidewalks cleaned off after a snow-storm.


