Cleave, a veteran municipal official, who steps up as deputy-reeve from his council seat.
Two nominees for council, Messrs. W. A. Wilson and J. G. Gillies declined to let their names stand for election, which leaves a field of four seeking election for the three council seats—C. Howard May, George Currie, W. O. Brownridge and R. N. Brown. Esqueusing ratepayers will go to the polls on New Year's Day to cast their ballots for their municipal councillors for 1945.

Yesterday morning, Mrs. Greensward received a letter from the Independent Short Wave Monitor, New York, telling of a short wave broadcast picked up from Berlin which reported her husband a prisoner-of-war.

The names of all on the Honour Roll were rehearsed at the Midnight Eucharist on Christmas Eve.

Mrs. Fred Armstrong, secretary of the War Services Committee, was in charge of obtaining names and addresses, as well as sending the gifts. On behalf of St. George's Church, the Committee wish to take this opportunity of extending the Season's Greetings to all the members on the Honour Roll, and hope that the New Year will bring Victory and Peace.

Tennant didn't give any details of where he captured it, so that story will have to wait till after the war.

The other items are a German parachute flare and a piece of a parachute, sent to his nephew and purchased by Lieut. Paul Barber from England. The parachute has German markings on the cloth.
