PEEL COUNTY FARMERS ADAPT CALFHOOD VACCINATION

The newly-formed County Committee, under the chairmanship of R. Cooper, Mono Road, has launched on a programme of calfhood vaccination for the County of Peel. Calves between the ages of four and eight months are vaccinated in order that they may develop a natural immunity or resistance to Bang's Disease, commonly known as contagious abortion.

Immunizing the young is not a new thing. We vaccinate our children against smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, and many other diseases. Calfhood vaccination is not a new thing either, because it has been practised on a small scale and in individual herds for many years. This is the first time that an attempt has been made to have a fully vaccinated county.

The cost to the farmer is 25c per calf, which covers both the vaccination and the subsequent blood test. The farmer must make application for this service to the Agricultural Representative for Peel County on cards provided by the Department of Agriculture. These cards are in the process of being mailed to all farmers in the County of Peel together with a letter outlining the policy, as well as the responsibility of the farmer and the veterinarian. This work is undertaken with the co-operation of the veterinarians in Peel County and surrounding district. Applications will be dealt with in the order which they are received, which bears out the old principle of "first in first served."

This is a wholly voluntary effort and no one will be forced to have his calves vaccinated. It is, however, in the best interest of our live stock industry to have as large a percentage of the calves vaccinated as possible, which places the responsibility on every farmer in the County of Peel to see that his neighbour is well acquainted with the project and with the advantages of calfhood vaccination. The sub-committee on calfhood vaccination is headed by J. W. Pawley.
