

Dr. C. H. Heslop Warden Of Halton for 1945

Committees Appointed at Inaugural Meeting on Tuesday—By-laws Passed in Preparation for Year's Work—Other Items from First Meeting.

The inaugural meeting of the 1945 Halton County Council was held in the Court House Millon last Tuesday, when the following gentlemen took their seats:

The Clerk took the chair and called for nominations for the office of Warden which were as follows:

Dr. C. H. Heslop—nominated by C. Hillmer and N. Craig.
C. V. Hillmer—nominated by J. M. MacDonald and K. R. MacDonald.
Reeve Hillmer thanked the sponsors for his nomination, but asked that his name be withdrawn in favor of Dr. Heslop.

Mr. Craig moved that nominations be closed. Dr. Heslop was therefore unanimously elected Warden of the County for the year 1945.

The Warden elect made his declaration of office before His Honor Judge Munro, who congratulated him upon the high honor conferred upon him. Mrs. Pettit then came forward with the request that the Warden of the County be given a gown to wear, while conducting the sessions of the Council. Since Mrs. Pettit was prepared, with gown in hand, no protests were made and Dr. Heslop took the chair, the first Warden in Halton to wear a gown of office.

The Warden, in a brief address, thanked the members of the council for his election to office and business then got underway.

Minutes were read, following which the Reeves of the various municipalities formed a committee to appoint the Standing Committee for 1945.

The Striking Committee then submitted their report and it was moved by Smith, seconded by Whittaker, that the Council adopt the report of the Committee, which was as follows, the first named on each committee to be chairman.

Moved by K. R. MacDonald and N. Craig that the committee on printing ask for the customary tenders for minutes and reports, the limit for delivery of same be placed at January 15th, 1946.—Carried.

By-laws were passed as follows:
(1) To appoint auditors of the accounts.

(2) To appoint members of the County Board of Audit for the year 1946.
(3) To authorize borrowing of money to meet current expenses for the year 1945 also a request to the Minister of Highways for statutory grant on County Road system, based on the 1944 Road Expenditure amounting to \$71,471.56.

(4) To provide for total expenditure on County Road System for 1945. Council adjourned to Tuesday, January 23rd at 10:30 a.m.
