RECENTLY, we made a special study of egg prices and feed costs. We went back over egg markets and feed prices for the past 11 years, month by month. 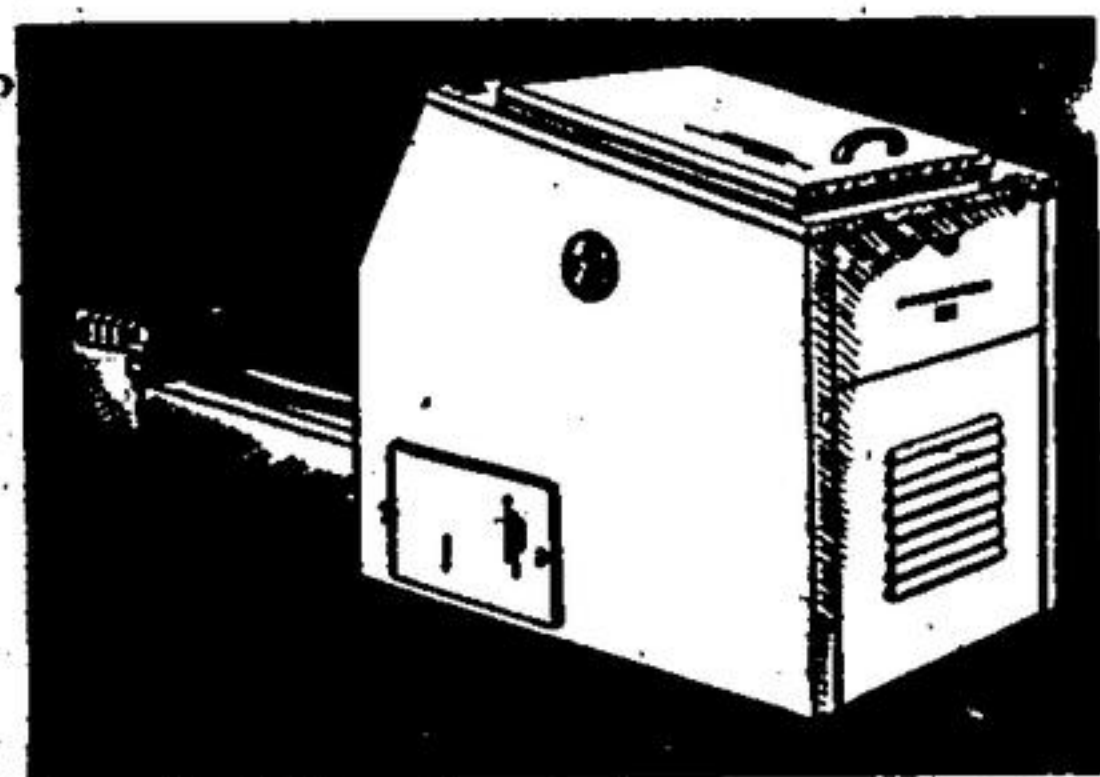
