Combines Whip Malton for First Time This Year

Revised Team Looks Good for Play-offs Which Start on Thursday Night

Norval-Georgetown Combines eked out their first win of the season over Victory Aircraft, Malton, when with a much bolstered team they whipped the visitors 3 to 2 in the last scheduled league game. In previous contests the Malton team had shown a rather superiority and it was encouraging to local fans to see the Combines come through with a win. The team has been strengthened to a point where they are now on a par with the league leaders.

The game on Monday night was one of the best seen in the arena for some time. The game was fast as might be expected when these two teams meet. There was plenty of excitement too as the Malton team seemed prone to take a beating, and high sticks and rough play, with the Combines retaliating, kept Referee Johnny Jones busy for almost the entire second and third periods. At times the teams were playing with only four men a side including the goalkeepers as the referee endeavoured to keep down the rough tactics by the penalizing method. One Malton player was penalized for five minutes when he was about to give the referee an argument.

The teams had to finally go into overtime before the score was settled at 3-2.

The Combines went out early in the game to get their first counter and managed to hold the lead until the end of the period. Both teams were playing a wide open brand of hockey and this gave the crowd something to cheer about. Early in the second period Malton took the initiative and evened the count and went ahead with two goals by Casburn. In their endeavour to hold the lead, some rough stuff was injected into the game and they soon found themselves lining the penalty bench.

The Combines continued their fast hockey into the third period and it was not long until the game was again tied up and overtime play necessitated. Continuing to press the visitors hard in the overtime, the Combines won out in the finish and looked like a coming aggregation to go into the play-offs.

A two-out-three game series will comprise the playoff, with the first game tomorrow night and the second scheduled for Monday the 19th.

ACTIVE SERVICE NOTES

We are always glad to hear news of Georgetown boys in the services and last week we noted an article in a Toronto daily which referred to Jack Cornett who was clerk in Robb's Drug Store before enlistment. Jack is now a Flying Officer with the RCAF, and was mentioned in a letter home to his folks in Dundalk by LAC Jack Duncan. P.O. Cornett, who was transferred to India some time ago, has been on jungle operations and it is presumed this is in Burma.

Pte. Bill Kay, son of Mr. and Mrs. Adam Kay, of Georgetown, was among those mentioned in an account of an action in which the Essex Scottish Regiment took part in Belgium. Pte. Kay was a member of a group which took 70 German prisoners during a raid on a canal.

Pte. Norman McDonald, Prisoner-of-war in Germany, spoke from Germany around February 5th, over the short wave, according to a large number of letters and cards received by his parents, from the United States, Quebec and Toronto, from people who had heard him speak. He gave a short message to his family, and spoke from Staling 2B, which is near Stettin in the Northern mouth of the Oder, now being liberated by the Russians.
