GEORGE SCOTT, FORMER GEORGETOWN, RETIRES AFTER 36 YEARS MAIL CARRIER

George Scott, one of the four original letter carriers in Galt, retired today from his services with the local post office. This was also his 67th birthday.

On looking back to August 12th, 1912, when carrier delivery was inaugurated in Galt Mr. Scott recalls that he was one of the four original postmen. He was given the hospital "walk," Walter Ritz, who retired in October, 1944, and Harry Needham and Harry Mills, who are still on the job, were the other members of the quartet. Mr. Scott has covered the same walk the entire 32 years and 6 months intervening, walking a distance which is estimated as equal to five times around the world and carrying approximately four and a half million pieces of mail.

Honoured by Staff

Before leaving on his final "walk" Mr. Scott was honoured by the post-office staff. Postmaster Peter Mullin made an address and Charlie Gravelle presented him with a check from his associates.

Mr. Scott came to Galt from the Glen Williams - Georgetown district in 1901. He was employed for twelve years with McGregor and Gourlay and when the letter carrier system was inaugurated he became a postal employee. He has seen many changes in Galt since he started out with letters in the summer of 1912. He has been one of the most regular visitors at the hospital, making two calls daily. He has seen eight superintendents come and go. Only two doctors are now in attendance at the hospital who were practising when he started his rounds. They are Dr. Ward Woolner and Dr. C. R. Cummins.

Ward Five - the hospital region which he has served - has stretched out to include new streets and many, many new families. On Grand Avenue Mr. Scott delivered mail to only about 10 families who were on his original delivery.

The volume of mail has grown tremendously throughout the years, keeping pace with the increase in population. Grocery stores in this area increased from two in 1912 to seven today.

Active in Sports

Aside from his postal duties Mr. Scott has been actively interested in the promotion of junior and juvenile sports, particularly baseball. He admits however, that lacrosse was his game as a youth, although he never played lacrosse during the time he had lived in Galt.

Mr. Scott said today that one of the best friends he ever had on the walk was the late John Brownlee. In bygone days when mud roads and lack of cement sidewalks made the trip very going, he recalls that Mr. Brownlee called him in during the flooded spring season to secure a change of footwear and a cup of hot coffee.

Mr. Scott has no immediate plans since his retirement, other than to enjoy a rest at his home, 91 Aberdeen road, Galt. — Galt Daily Reporter.
